In September the Consulate General of Ireland to the Western United States, Robert O'Driscoll made a visit to the Beehive State. His visit was centered around the promotion of education in Ireland and the summer study and working holiday program under which matriculated graduate students can qualify for an Irish working visa for six months to one year after graduation.

Robert took meetings with the Salt Lake Tribune, the University of Utah as well as the Board & Trustees of the Hibernian Society and also introduced himself to those Hibernian members that were present at the informal meet and greet at Fiddlers Elbow. He was eager to know how the Consulate could be of assistance to the Hibernians and to the membership. Weird & Wonderful Irish Facts

- Abbán was the real first saint of Ireland
- Dame Alice Kytler from Kilkenny was the last known witch in Ireland
- Turlough O'Carolan wrote the tune of the "Star Spangled Banner, he died 35 years before the American revolution
- Louth is the smallest county in Ireland
- Historians believe St. Patrick's real name was Maewyn Succat
- Eamon de Valera returned to Ireland from his American fundraising tour in 1920, via Liverpool, by hiding in a container filled with potatoes
- Countess Markievicz was the first woman to be elected to the House of Commons
- The United States was the first country to recognize Ireland's Independence
- Ireland's 15 principal railways are named after the leaders of the 1916 Uprising

- In olden days, a pig was often allowed to live in the house with the family on an Irish farm and was referred as "The gentleman who pays the rent"
- According to legend, a ringing in your ears means that a deceased friend is stuck in purgatory ringing a bell
- The lease of the original Guinness Brewery in Dublin was for 9,000 years
- The majority of people attribute the Guillotine to the French (hence the name), but there is evidence of it being used in Ireland 500 years before it made its way to France. A man named Murcod Ballagh seemingly used it for an execution near Merton in county Galway on April 1st – the unfortunate victim and their crime is unknown.
